Dear friends, I hope this finds you well.

It is becoming a bit of a trope to say that 'this November will be unlike any other' due to the expectation of the number of ways in which the Coronavirus epidemic will continue to affect us. And I am sure that I am not alone in anticipating the prescient sense of needing to widen the season of Remembrance to include those who have lost loved ones to the virus this year, as well as continuing to hold close in our memories and esteem, those who gave their lives during areas of conflict in the past.

In fact, I would go further and affirm that we should continue to recognise the loss and grief of those caught up in this – and other – unforeseeable circumstances, as we continue through the year, and years, ahead.

But just as every couple who attend a wedding are invited to reflect upon their own vows and commitments; just as everyone who encounters a family with new born children may reflect upon their own, perhaps now grown up, children; just as every set of hand-holding young lovers may remind us of our first encounters with love at its most intense; so each occasion of Remembrance may bring memories and recollections of our own personal losses.

I would suggest that Remembrance's great difference is in its communal aspect. We are not merely individuals marking an event and sitting in a solitary place, reliving our memories. No, instead, we are gathering with one another to share together the marking of our grief; the standing together is as much a part of the ceremony and the recollections of those we are honouring, as the dates and the specific times.

In years to come I do expect, and indeed hope to, see Churches and communities finding ways to mark and remember the specific difficulties of the Coronavirus epidemic in this country and around the world. But, for now, I hope we will be able to 'fold into' the National Act of Remembrance our concern and hopes, not only for those in wars long ceased, but also for those whose grief remains all too present, fighting as they are, against the pandemic that surrounds us.

And may we know ourselves likewise folded into the loving arms of our one true hope and sure foundation – then and now – the love of God, come to us in and through the person of Jesus Christ. Amen. Peace to you and your families and loved ones,

The **Sunday 9am service** is a very welcome return. Everyone is confident that we are keeping people safe, with a non-contact sanitiser at the entrance (thanks to Bola for donating it!) and seating arranged to enforce social distancing. Communion is organised so that we do not have to go too close to other participants. Everyone is wearing a facemask, and we keep a few in reserve in case people have forgotten to bring one. Those who are unable to attend are grateful to Nicola for the service streamed for all on Sunday morning and available at any time from 9am.

Harvest Festival: the service was well attended, with a lovely arrangement of donations. These were later distributed to local people and to the Food Bank. Generous giving to the collection enabled us to send £170 to the Bishop's annual appeal, which this year went to enable earthquake victims in Nepal to earn a living through beekeeping. We are sad that we could not hold the Harvest Lunch which usually contributes to the fund.

Remembrance Sunday on 8th November: the 9am Remembrance Family Service, at the church, is the village's Act of Remembrance to commemorate those who fought in the world wars. (see pp. 14 and 15). The collection will be donated to the Royal British Legion. Everyone is welcome to join in this tribute to all who have fought or suffered in war.

It was a 'different' service, but the church was beautifully decorated and traditional harvest music was played by Matthew Huggins – many thanks to him for adding so inspiringly to the atmosphere. It was well attended – difficult to squeeze everybody in with social distancing, but it was lovely to see people of all ages taking part and giving so generously to the Food Bank and the Bishop's Harvest Appeal, this year going to beekeepers in Nepal. £110 was raised for this worthy cause.

Remembrance Sunday will also be different this year. We shall gather outside the War Memorial at the Methodist Church at 10am on Sunday 8th November, when the Act of Remembrance will take place, followed by wreath-laying. ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI

This was written by Marjorie Metcalfe as part of the celebrations for 800 years of Studham Church. The celebrations – and those for Kensworth Church – had to be cancelled because of Coronavirus.

During the reign of Henry III, the first vicar at Studham was Henricus. You can see from the board towards the back of the church where all the vicars are listed, his name is shown in 1220. We don't know much about him. But we do know that the church had been granted to the priory of Dunstable. Henricus would be answerable to them.

The Priory Church of St Peter at that time included a monastery with a dormitory for the monks, an infirmary, stables, workshops, bakehouse, brewhouse and buttery. There was also a hostel for pilgrims and travellers. That was quite a lucrative business!!!



But another man was becoming an influence in England at that time. We still remember him today. It was Saint Francis of Assisi. He never visited England but some close companions of his did and they were keen to share his amazing story. So although there was no TV or mobile phones with WhatsApp or internet with blogs, news soon spread.

Francis of Assisi was born in 1181 in Italy to a very rich family. His father owned lands and his cloth business meant that the family had all the luxuries of the times. Francis was spoilt - and got anything he wanted. He wanted to be a famous knight or military hero! So when a war started, he joined the cavalry, which was only possible because his family could afford to pay for his horse and the equipment needed. Following a devastating defeat, many were killed or taken prisoner. Francis was one of those taken prisoner and suffered dreadfully in a bleak prison underground. For the first time he was forced to turn aside from his own ambitions and concentrate on God's vision.

So, when he finally was able to return home, his attitude was very different. If he met someone ill or suffering, he stopped to help them. He especially wanted to do something that would be meaningful and would please God. He gave up all the pleasures and comforts of a wealthy life and set about rebuilding a wrecked building of a church all on his own.

This was the start of the Franciscan order of friars who spent their energy on sharing the good news and helping the poor. How opportune that they arrived in England about the time that our church in Studham was being established.

NHS COVID-19 APP - from CBC

The NHS COVID-19 App, launched at the end of September, is used alongside existing contact tracing. It allows people to 'check-in' to venues by scanning a QR code and alerts individuals that have spent time near other app users, whom they may not know personally and who later test positive for coronavirus. Some council buildings, such as children's centres and leisure facilities, will have posters displaying a QR code. Currently, this doesn't apply to locations such as council offices.

All businesses that deal with the public face to face have to take customer contact details. Please adhere to social distancing guidelines and stay two metres apart. The Acts of Remembrance will be appropriate but short.

The **Church Calendar days** marked this month are:

1st, **All Saints' Day**; the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now in heaven. When the English Reformation took place, the number of saints in the calendar was drastically reduced, with the result that All Saints' Day stood out with a prominence that it had never had before.

2nd, **All Souls**; in bygone centuries, All Souls' Day was certainly uncomfortable for anyone who had wronged a person who had then died. For it was believed that souls in purgatory could appear on earth on this day, in the form of ghosts, witches or toads, to haunt anyone who had wronged them in life.

22nd, **St Cecilia**, patron saint of musicians, with a celebrated stained-glass window in Kensworth Church;

30th, **St Andrew the Apostle**, patron saint of Scotland (though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8th century to Fife and preserved at a church in a place now named St Andrews).

LOCAL INTEREST

SPOOKY MEMORIES in KENSWORTH

These memories were prompted by a recent visit to Kensworth by the daughter of a former Vicar, Rev'd Ivan Young, who was here for over 40 years, 1937 – 1981. The family lived in the Old Vicarage in Spratts Lane. Every morning the two daughters walked along Spratts Lane to catch the bus to school, and each day they would meet a farmhand on his way to work in the fields. They would exchange greetings as they passed. One morning, however, he seemed lost in thought and walked on past them without saying anything. That evening, when they came home, they remarked on this to their parents. The Vicar shook his head. The old man had died the night before....

(And that is a true story!)

More ghostly happenings, this time along the Lynch. There was a little wood there, Dame Sayer's Wood. She was an old woman who, many years ago, lived in a little hut in the wood. She was good with herbal remedies, and was regarded as a kind of witch. After her death the locals always regarded the wood as haunted: there were weird unexplained events, strange sounds, and the local farmers found that their tractors frequently broke down when they were in the neighbouring fields. Eventually, in the 1960s, one of the farmers had had enough and cut the trees down. But machinery continued to misbehave. They then asked the Vicar (Rev'd Young) to perform a service of exorcism, which he duly did. And since then, no problems have ever occurred in the area. Another true story!

LET NATURE into YOUR GARDEN this WINTER TIME!

Lockdown gave many of us the time and space to really appreciate the beauty of the countryside that surrounds our villages, and to get closer to nature. Now that autumn is here, we can all do our bit by making our gardens wildlife friendly, and a safe winter haven for birds, insects, hedgehogs and more.

When tidying the garden ready for winter, try not to be too scrupulous, as hedgehogs and other wildlife can use fallen leaves and twigs to build a cosy nest. Leaving some old flower stems and seed heads will provide both food and shelter. A wildlife area also creates a home for insects that hedgehogs and birds can feed on. Try not to disturb compost heaps between November and March as you may disturb hibernating guests.

Keep bird feeders clean and topped up with food as the birds will depend on them, especially as winter progresses and berries are in short supply. Fat balls are a good source of calories. Also try to provide some clean water that is free from ice (by putting a table tennis ball in the water). A nesting box will provide shelter for smaller birds in winter and they will often repay you by returning to nest in the springtime. Then sit back and enjoy watching the wildlife come in!



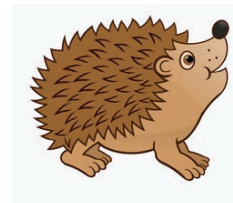
FRIENDS OF STUDHAM COMMON

The next work party will be on the following day, Saturday 21st November. The day's work will include thinning trees and cutting and clearing grass and bracken from the glade by Church Road, and also on parts of the Old School House meadow on West Common. This has the conservation objective of reducing nutrients to prevent overgrowth in some areas while leaving other areas uncut to provide good ground cover for small mammals and birds. In addition, we will be lightly trimming the old gorse, to encourage its survival and regeneration, to provide a habitat for gorse-feeding insects and nesting birds.

If you wish to join the volunteer group please do come and help out; we meet at the War Memorial on West Common, opposite the Red Lion at 10am.

REMEMBER, REMEMBER the FIFTH of NOVEMBER!



The 5th of November 1605 is remembered each year in the UK, during Guy Fawkes Night. People build large bonfires, light fireworks, and burn figures of Fawkes (known as 'the guy').

Guy Fawkes (13 April 1570 – 31 January 1606) sometimes known as Guido Fawkes, was a member of a group of Roman Catholic revolutionaries from England who planned to carry out the Gunpowder Plot. Fawkes and the other plotters planned to kill the king, James I, and replace him with a Catholic monarch.

November 5 was the date when Parliament re-assembled after a long recess. The plot was uncovered quite late; Fawkes was arrested as he sat in a cellar, near the gunpowder, waiting for the right time to set it off. He was tortured to make him reveal the names of the other plotters. Later eight men, including Fawkes, were found guilty of high treason and executed by hanging in Westminster, except for Fawkes, who killed himself by jumping from the scaffold before he was to be hanged.
