Dear friends and parishioners,

One of the most important parts of my ministry is the privilege of taking funeral services, in our three churches, or at a local crematorium. Though always sad, these services always include thanksgiving for a life, and for all that the loved one gave to those around them.

Sometimes people express surprise at the fact that anyone can have a funeral in their local church, even if they didn't go to church themselves – but they can. The Church of England is there for everyone in the parish. People also sometimes say they're surprised how deeply personal the services are – but, just like any humanist celebrant, I always take a great deal of care in crafting each service individually. Just as every person is different, so should every service be.

In our society today we sometimes struggle to talk or even think about dying or death, but it can be very helpful to share with our nearest and dearest our wishes for what might happen to us. In my experience it really helps families when they are having to make what seems like endless decisions and deal with a lot of paperwork, all in a position where they are themselves psychologically or emotionally challenged. If you are in a position where you can have a conversation about this with those you love, it will help them.

I believe that we are all created in God's image, and that image is one of everlasting love. I pray for all those who have lost loved ones, especially recently, that they might trust that those we love but see no longer, are held evermore in God's love, as we are, in remembering them.

# **MISCELLANEOUS**

#### WHAT IS THE MEANING OF LENT?

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in Spring, when the days begin to get longer. Lent is 40 days long to reflect the 40 days Jesus Christ spent in the desert leading up to his crucifixion. It is a six-week festival, not including Sundays, in the build-up to Easter, when Jesus rose from the dead, three days after he was crucified.

Jesus went into the desert to fast and pray before beginning his work for God. He was tempted several times by Satan, but was able to resist.

Lent allows Christians to remember Jesus' fasting in the desert. It is a time of giving things up and a test of self-discipline.

There are many foods that some Christians do not eat in Lent, such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. Some Christians just give up something they really enjoy, such as cakes or chocolate.

You could also do extra things in Lent, such as helping people.

# **ECO CHURCH**

It seems an odd time to write about conserving water when, outside, it is pouring with rain. However, we know that in the summer, there will likely be water shortages and more frequent droughts as the climate gets warmer. We need to check our water usage all year round and try to conserve water as households. The World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) has ten tips to reduce our water consumption.

- 1. Switch from baths to showers. Try keeping your shower to 4 minutes or less.
- 2. Keep your sprinklers off. A water butt collects water throughout the year.
- 3. Turn off the tap. Running taps waste as much as 6 litres of water a minute.
- 4. Fill up a washing up bowl. Cleaning the cleanest items first means you're unlikely to need to change the water saving a huge amount compared to washing everything under the tap.
- 5. Make sure your dishwasher is full! Dishwashing compared to hand washing saves 6000L a year. Not pre-rinsing saves another 1000L a year.
- 6. Use leftover water from cooking or from rinsing your veg to water your plants or use on the garden.
- 7. Fix leaky taps.
- 8. Fit low flow aerators on your taps and showers. These cheap adaptors aerate your water supply. You get the same water pressure but much less water.
- 9. Keep a jug of cold water in the fridge so that you always have a supply.
- 10. Only fill up the kettle with how much you need.

#### **HOW IS LENT CELEBRATED?**

# **Shrove Tuesday (21st February)**

In western Christian churches, the day before Lent starts is **Shrove Tuesday**, also known as **Pancake Day**. This day was traditionally the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent. Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday, as they were a simple meal that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.

Shrove comes from the verb 'to shrive' which means to confess sins.

# Ash Wednesday (22<sup>nd</sup> February)

On Ash Wednesday many Christian churches hold services during which Christians are marked on the forehead with a cross of ashes. This is a sign of saying sorry to God for any wrong-doing.

# WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - VOLUNTEERS DIARY

So Christmas has come and gone and the cutting of all the defining hedges is still our main priority at the Tree Cathedral. We need to get all of this done as soon as possible before the bird nesting season starts in March. We are also still collecting leaves along with the laurel cuttings and our leaf pile is getting huge.

February is when we tend to clear the bonfire area in preparation for the big stick pick-up, which happens before we start mowing the grass. There are plenty of branches and larger pieces of wood littered around already and there will be many more coming down in the windy weeks of February.

This year we felled three trees from the Christmas Chapel, one of which went in the church. The area will now need our attention as all the surplus branches and debris needs carting up to the bonfire area.

The dew pond area will also need some more attention. There are areas where the brambles have started to come through and areas where animals have dug. We have plenty of piles of wood chip, so we can re-cover those areas.

All this is preparation for the warmer months to come when we can watch as all the trees and shrubs start to bud up and burst into new life ready to start the new cycle. Come and say hello on Tuesday mornings 9am – 12pm.

# **HELPFUL ADVICE**

#### **GARDENING TIPS for FEBRUARY**

This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs, climbers and evergreen hedges.

- 1. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- 2. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- 3. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops
- 4. Prune wisteria
- 5. Prune evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- 6. Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea
- 7. Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses

While weather remains cold during February, it's important you continue any regular bird feeding and provide your local wildlife with clean, unfrozen water.

# Make a wildlife pond

Building a good pond is one of the single most important steps you can take to support your local nature.

It will provide a home and feeding ground for so many different creatures, from invertebrates like pond-skaters and dragonflies to amphibians like frogs and toads. Your garden birds can also use the pond to drink and bathe.

You'll need to make sure any pond has deeper and shallower areas, and it's really important it has an easy escape route for any non-aquatic animals (like hedgehogs) that fall in. Some folk add escape 'ladders' to help with this - but the safest thing is to construct a pond with a very gentle slope out of the water on one side.

# **A SAFETY TIP**

If you are buying something using your credit/debit card, and you are not entirely sure how reliable the seller is, insert your card in the machine, and then input an incorrect PIN number. The machine should come up with a message saying "incorrect PIN, please enter again". In which case you can enter your correct PIN and complete the transaction.

If the machine accepts the incorrect pin number, and gives a receipt, it is a counterfeit machine trying to take your PIN number to access your account. Remove your card and refuse the transaction, safe in the knowledge that they have not got your correct PIN number, nor been able to take any money from your account.
