#### Dear all

At the time of writing this, the weather is fluctuating between cold, wet and just plain grey. Soon winter will fall away, and spring will appear. Like a mysterious scratch card – its not that life was absent, it just got hidden. Language is bothering me at the moment. I am not even sure what to call these bits of the year that are neither Christmas nor spring; and which simply act as padding in the calendar. In the church these 'gaps' are referred to as 'ordinary time.' When you've celebrated every possible part of the Christian journey, the remainder is ordinary time.

I am sure that at first glance this just looks like a random rant, but I have a real affection for ordinary time. Life's great roller coaster would be unbearable without the plateaux of peace when we can take a breath, read a book and finally get round to the laundry. Cliché suggests that we should take time along the path to smell the roses, but they are not even in flower yet. Now is the time to sit with a warm cup of tea and dream of the roses to come, the adventures ahead.

There is a lovely bible reading that says, "6 Aren't five sparrows sold for two pennies?[a] Yet not one of them is forgotten before God.[b] 7 In fact, even the hairs on your head are all numbered. Do not be afraid;[c] you are more valuable than many sparrows.' (Luke 12:6-8) If we could trust that simple statement, maybe we could calm down and assume that just 'being' us was enough. Imagine not having all that pressure, of being free to be you? There is an ordinary version of all of us and it's a comfortable place to be. Between changing the world, we need to be able to settle back into a consistent shape.

The film 'About Time,' suggests that we be much more aware of our ordinary days as we go through them. Instead of treating them as a burden, we seek all those special moments hidden amongst the banal. The passing smiles and glances, the little things we miss, the humour. It suggests we train ourselves to enjoy every moment regardless of how ordinary. So at the time of writing there is a bird sitting on the tree looking down on the new stems of daffodils breaking through the icy ground. The sun is easing through the grey sky and lighting a low mist over the fields. This ordinary day is still and calm. The dawn has come, and nothing is required except that we see it. God the artist painting a new world.

# TRIBUTES TO ROGER KENDRICK AND JOHN WEATHERHEAD Roger Kendrick

Up to the week of his sudden death, Roger came to the church every Sunday with his wife Sylvia and his children to lead the bellringers. He was an expert ringer, well-known and respected in the bell ringing community. As tower captain, he had installed the church's present ring of six bells and looked after them ever since. During this time he trained many new ringers who went on to serve in towers all over the country. In addition he contributed to all our fund-raising and social events, notably the summer fete and the Historic Churches Bike and Hike.

Roger made a strong contribution to society. In his work as a chemist he cared for the environment, leading the removal of pollutants from the waste produced in his industry. After he retired, he became a school governor, chairing a governing body and was judged 'the best governor we have ever had'.

#### John Weatherhead

John, who died after bravely fighting a long and painful illness, was one of Whipsnade's best-known and most respected characters. He loved his many years working as head keeper of the elephants in the zoo, including providing guidance and support to keepers in other zoos throughout Britain and abroad. His written memoirs about his work with elephants sold well, and his talks on the subject were well attended.

Along with his wife Sheila, John contributed substantially to the life of the village, especially the church, for over 40 years. Even after he became ill, he helped with the maintenance of the church and churchyard, and also supported all of the social events. He was a good friend to many people in the village, and he will be very much missed.

# 25<sup>th</sup> MARCH – LADY DAY (and your taxes!)

In Tudor England, the New Year began on 25th March, a day known as the Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin, or (Our) Lady Day. It was a feast day commemorating the day that the Virgin Mary was first told by the Angel Gabriel that she was carrying Jesus. It is, of course, nine months before Christmas Day, the day on which we celebrate the day Christ was born.

Lady Day was the first day of the calendar year in England until 1752, when the first day of the year was changed to 1st January and the Gregorian Calendar replaced the Julian Calendar which had become distorted from the solar calendar and become some 10 days adrift.

That year, 2<sup>nd</sup> September was followed by 14<sup>th</sup> September to make the correction. The Treasury, worried about losing tax revenues, changed the tax year to 5<sup>th</sup> April, later, in 1800 to 6<sup>th</sup> April, for the collection of taxes! (For your information, George II was King and the Prime Minister was the Whig, Henry Pelham). And that has marked the beginning of the tax year ever since.

# **GREEN VOLUNTEERING**

#### WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - A VOLUNTEERS DIARY

So, we have finally completed the mammoth task of cutting the laurels and other hedges that form all the delineated areas of The Tree Cathedral – the birds that have all started their spring rituals can now start building their nests. All the cuttings and the fallen leaves are now being tidied up and if you are taking the footpath through to the Visitor Centre on top of the downs you will undoubtedly notice the huge pile of leaves and debris that will start to mulch down in the coming months. We are now spending time tidying the Easter chapel ready for the beautiful display of daffodils and cherry blossom that will soon be flowering.

Other work we are concentrating on is the pollarding on the willow trees in the far west corner of the site. This involves cutting back all the annual growth which in the case of these trees can be up to 8 feet. This means we can control the height and spread of the willows and also ensures vigorous and healthy new growth each year.



Again, this year we are persevering with the Viburnum hedge which borders the Christmas chapel. Last year, we managed to keep it free of Viburnum beetle by clearing the debris and fallen leaves from all the area underneath the hedge. This is where the beetles thrive if left and they appear in late March and lay their eggs in the foliage. The

larvae and adult beetle then attack the Viburnum and feed on the leaves quickly destroying the plants. Last year the hedge looked its healthiest for years, so we are determined to continue that this year.

Come and visit the Tree Cathedral this month and enjoy sitting in our chapels on our many animal-themed benches.

# MESSAGE FROM STUDHAM RESIDENT, KAREN WILKIN

I am collecting good quality children's clothing and shoes for ages 1-6 – all to be sent over to The Gambia next month – I shall personally distribute them to needy communities and nursery schools. This I have been doing since 2012.

In 2012, when out walking in The Gambia, I stumbled upon a run down nursery school - so I decided to step in and help. Sadly this is the case for many schools in the country where there are often crumbling classrooms, no sanitation and no resources – the staff working for free for the benefit of the children. Communities are generally extremely poor, with many having no running water or electricity and many children not going to school.



Since then I have built 2 houses as the owners both had theirs washed away in the floods. I have put good 4 nursery schools - repairing the buildings, instigating a curriculum, teaching the staff how to teach child-led lessons, providing decent toilets, providing mosquito nets, regular stationery and daily bread.

I rely on donations from friends and family and work slowly, slowly to achieve the end goal. To this end, I have also started shipping children's clothes, shoes and toys as above for the age group I teach. Usually I send boxes over every 2 months and then distribute them to the communities I know when I visit. Hence the plea for more items if anyone can help.

#### **MOTHERING SUNDAY**

The date of Mothering Sunday changes each year in the UK. The date depends on when Easter is, but always will be the 4th Sunday of Lent – this year, March 19th.

During the 16th century, a tradition began when Christians would visit the church they had been baptised in, called their 'Mother Church', on the fourth Sunday of Lent. That's how it got its name.

At that time, it was common for children to leave home and get a job in domestic service. This would mean that they lived at the place they worked and were not allowed home very often. Mothering Sunday was a rare day off, when all children were allowed to go home and visit their Mother Church and their mothers. As they walked home, they would pick wild flowers along the paths and give them to their mothers. This led to the tradition of giving mothers flowers on Mothering Sunday.
