I'm writing this in the week before Easter, when we remember Jesus's last days and his death, and also look forward in hope to the celebration of his resurrection on Easter Day.

As you read it, we'll be moving towards the excitement of the coronation of King Charles III, which will bring to a close the period of transition which began last September in loss and sadness, with the death of his mother, the late Queen.

God will be present in the anointing and crowning of our new King in Westminster Abbey, but is equally alive in each of us in Kensworth, Studham and Whipsnade, in our going out and our coming in.

KENSWORTH VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall have had a very good financial year, mainly due to the excellent work done by Sylvia Inns in promoting the hall to enquirers and making a lot of ad hoc bookings. We are also pleased to have some more regular bookings for village activities: early in May we have new regular weekly Pilates and Yoga classes starting, so if you are looking to get fit and trim for summer, come along and try it! Times and dates to follow on village notices.

The Annual General Meeting of the Village Hall Management Committee will take place on **Tuesday 2nd May at 7pm** in the main hall. This will be followed by a short Committee Meeting for urgent issues at 8pm. We hope that residents will come along to the meeting to show their interest in the use of the Village Hall for so many events and regular activities.

We are asking younger people to come and join the Committee for the coming year, as we have a busy year with the **Coronation event on Sunday 7th May**, and we have bookings for the hall into 2024. We are also planning redecoration and other improvements to make sure the hall retains its excellent reputation and standards.

We urgently need new people to become Trustees of the Village Hall Charity, as the three remaining Trustees are in their 70s and 80s – should anything happen to these three Trustees, then the Charity would not be able to continue and the Hall would have to close. This would be devastating for the village, as we have so many regular village meetings, but the rules for charities are very strict. We recently lost our Chairman, Mike Sawyer, and other Trustees who have moved away from the village, so we need more people to become a Trustee. The role is not arduous, but they must ensure that the management committee are running the charity correctly, and submitting annual accounts to the Charity Commission.

ECO LIVING

As the weather begins to warm up, May is a wonderful time to start getting out into our beautiful countryside. It is also a good time to consider how we can enjoy ourselves outdoors, whilst still taking care of our precious environment.

- * Take all rubbish home with you. Whether having a snack or a full picnic, ensure all litter is put into a suitable bin or taken home for sorting and disposal.
- * Better yet, aim to have a zero-plastic picnic. Packing your food and drinks into washable, reusable containers which won't end up in landfill, helps protect the land.
- * Keep to marked footpaths or other open access areas to avoid damaging delicate plants or disturbing animals' homes. Some areas may be home to endangered species.
- * Reduce the carbon footprint of your time outdoors by exploring locally on foot as much as possible. Make use of a bike, scooter, or public transport if you need to travel further from home to enjoy the countryside. There are often more natural areas to explore near our homes than we realise.
- * Look out for opportunities to help your environment while spending time outside. This might include activities such as; clearing litter from wild areas or beaches or volunteering with other conservation projects, such as planting trees.

DUNSTABLE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The next meeting is on 9^{th} May: A talk by Paul Brown on "The Missing Mansion", Linslade's largest house (now demolished) built by Henry Finch. At 7.45pm in the Methodist Church Hall, The Square, Dunstable. Visitors welcome, £2.

The Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III will take place on 6th May. Like previous coronations, it will combine ancient traditions and adaptations reflecting our modern world. Since 1066, with the coronation of William I, English, (later British, since the Act of Union with Scotland), coronations have taken place in Westminster Abbey, and the service is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The coronation traditionally contains several key parts, including:



The Oath

The monarch promises to rule according to the law and with mercy.

The Anointing

The monarch is anointed with holy oil on the hands, breast, and head, using the 12th-century Coronation Spoon.

The Investiture

The monarch is presented with items from the Coronation Regalia, which are special clothes and objects symbolising their powers and responsibilities.

The final object is St Edward's Crown, placed on the monarch's head as a sign of royal majesty and dignity. Later in the ceremony the monarch wears the Imperial State Crown to process from the Abbey.

King Charles will sit on the Coronation Chair during the ceremony, as his predecessors have done since 1300. The chair houses the Stone of Scone, sometimes called "the Stone of Destiny", which is an ancient symbol of Scottish monarchy. The Stone was taken from Scotland by Edward I in 1296 and sent to Westminster Abbey. (Google it to follow its many adventures!)

Crowning a New Queen Consort

For the first time since 1937, the coronation of King Charles III will include the crowning of a Queen Consort. Queen Elizabeth, wife of King George VI, was the last Queen Consort to be crowned in 1937. Her Majesty Queen Camilla will be crowned in a similar, but simpler, ceremony after the crowning of the King.

The Coronation Procession Route

After the coronation service there will be a procession through the streets of London, following a traditional route that will allow as many people as possible to view the newly crowned King and Queen Consort.



WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - VOLUNTEERS DIARY

A job that has been on our agenda at the Tree Cathedral for some time now is to reinstate the view from The Chancel and all the way down The Nave looking west for many miles. This view has become totally obscured, due to the perimeter hedge getting overgrown and holly bushes spreading and maturing into substantial trees. We have now started to return this portion of the boundary hedge to its former state and thus revealing the amazing view beyond.

The first job was to check the area for any signs of birds starting to nest but a lot of the area is dead wood, and brambles, and we are happy that we are not disturbing anything. Once we started, we realized that a lot of the area was holly trees and bushes. Holly leaves once fallen form a spiky dense carpet of leathery leaves and this can take years to rot. It also self-seeds with lots of little holly bushes making it some task to clear the area. The good thing about this project is the proximity to the bonfire area! Saves us time and energy! We have only managed a couple of bonfires so far this year, mainly due to the very wet spring, but it's a job we need to keep on top of.

Shady areas are very important as we come into the summer months and we have lots of areas in the Tree Cathedral with shade and seats. The dew pond area is very popular and it offers both shade and sun. It is framed by tall mature cypress trees, which provide shade, and it is also a great area for children to run around. The Summer chapel with the Gospel Oak is another shady area where the grass and vegetation are left to flourish, providing a great habitat for the many butterflies to thrive. The Christmas chapel is a great area for children to explore and run around and we keep a mowed path through it and around the Christmas trees. The rest of the area is strimmed regularly to prevent the brambles and stinging nettles taking over and restricting the growth of the Christmas trees.
