Waste and Landfill

"Don't litter, put it in the bin", we say, but then what happens to it?

We are conscientious with regards to littering our streets, we see the obvious impact daily, but we don't see what happens to our waste which is thrown away. Much of the waste and landfill is unnecessary packaging which gets binned the minute we access the delicious but out-of-season raspberries or new game.

Buy food that hasn't come far, that doesn't need hermetically sealed packaging to keep fresh as it travels hundreds of miles.

What about sanitary products, nappies and wet wipes? These are classed as disposable, but do they have to be? These products are pretty new, first being available around 1950s but not commonly used till the '60s. There is a revolution in washable sanitary products, moon cups and washable nappies. I can vouch, having brought up my 3 children in the 2000s with washable nappies and myself using a moon cup or washable sanitary towels – it really isn't difficult. All these products are easily available on-line, in local pharmacies and supermarkets – buy once, it saves the environment and your money!

WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL – VOLUNTEERS DIARY

The Annual Tree Cathedral Service is on Sunday 11th June at 3pm (see above) and this is the time for people to come and celebrate the beauty and spiritual meaning of the Tree Cathedral.

The story began in 1925 when a young Edmund Kell Blyth converted a pair of old cottages in Whipsnade into a holiday home for poor London families in memory of three close comrades killed in the First World War. These were Arthur Bailey, John Bennett and Francis Holland, who actually died later in 1930.

It was in 1930, that Mr Blyth and his wife visited Liverpool Anglican Cathedral, which fully lived up to their expectations. On the drive home, they stopped to watch the sun set through a copse of trees and this is where the idea was born.

He then set about the idea of creating a Cathedral by using trees to represent walls and doorways, the Chancel being a half circle of silver birches. With the help of just one man, Albert Bransom, they started planting. The plans follow that of a traditional medieval cathedral.

The Tree Cathedral has never been consecrated but as Edmund Blyth said in 1940. "It is managed to emphasize the vigour and balance of individual plants in patterns that create an enclosure for worship and meditation, offering heightened awareness of God's presence and transcendence."

22ND JUNE - SAINT DAY OF ST ALBAN

Alban was the very first Christian martyr in Britain – or at least the first we know of. A 'martyr' is someone who has died for the faith – the word literally means 'witness'. He was probably killed during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian in the early years of the fourth century, in the late stages of the Roman occupation of Britain. His martyrdom took place in the amphitheatre outside the Roman city of Verulamium, which is now St Albans.



This month we will be treated to a talk by our own Vicar, Revd. Canon Nicola Lenthall. Her talk is entitled: "Sorry I'm late, Bishop, the teddy bear fell down the toilet! - 20 plus years of a mum in ministry". I think that says it all!

NATIONAL FUDGE DAY

Did you know that 16th June is National Fudge Day? Such a popular sweet was actually invented in error!

The story dates from 1886 in Baltimore in the USA. A confectioner made a mistake (a fudge – an old word for a mistake) while trying to make toffee, but ended up creating something just as tasty. We celebrate this happy accident on June 16th, which is National Fudge Day. In the late 19th and early 20th century, recipes for it spread like mad among students in America, and then all round the world.

National Fudge Day is the perfect excuse to try some exotic new flavours of fudge. Think about sampling and be adventurous; it might be fun to mix up some particularly unusual flavours, like carrot and orange, liquorice, or – for grown-ups only – tequila and lime.

Ingredients for basic fudge

397g tin condensed milk 450g/1lb light brown soft sugar 120g/4½oz butter, cubed 125ml/4fl oz milk pinch salt

Method

- 1. Line a 20cm/8inch square tin with baking paper. Place a glass of cold water in the fridge with ice cubes.
- 2. Place all the ingredients, apart from the salt, into a large, dry saucepan over a low heat. Stir until the butter has melted and the sugar has dissolved.
- 3. Slowly bring the mixture to a rolling boil over a medium-high heat for 10 minutes. Stir continuously, especially around the edges, to stop the mixture catching on the bottom of the pan and burning.
- 4. Once the mixture has reduced and darkened, carefully dip a teaspoon into the mixture and drizzle it into your glass of iced water (remove the ice cubes.) It should become a soft, pliable ball you can squash with your fingers when dropped into the iced water. If it sticks to the glass or your fingers when you press it, continue to boil and test the mixture every 2–3 minutes, or until it passes the test.
- 5. Add a pinch of salt, then beat the mixture well. Leave to cool in the saucepan for 10 minutes. Beat the thickened mixture again, leave for another 5 minutes and beat again. Pour into the lined tin and level with the back of a spoon.
- 6. Refrigerate until completely firm (at least 3 hours) until you can cut through it easily with a knife. Remove the fudge from the tin, transfer to a chopping board and slice into 36 pieces (6x6) with a sharp knife.
