(See the Parish Directory on page 5 for their contact details, which remain available during my sabbatical.)

I look forward to seeing you all again from the beginning of December, and to celebrating my twenty years of ministry with the people of Kensworth, Studham and Whipsnade (it really doesn't seem possible that I began my time as your vicar in November 2003!).

Page 14 A SAD FAREWELL to GERRY BLACKBURN

Kensworth is mourning a much-loved and respected member of the community.



Gerry was a resident of Kensworth since 1973, and has always taken part in local activities. He grew up in the Crystal Palace area of London, and then spent the war years as a young schoolboy with his grandparents in Southern Ireland.

After leaving school he trained as a Metallurgist (science of metals). At eighteen, he did his National Service in the RAF, training as a wireless operator. He then went to work in London, where he joined the Young Conservatives and stayed a member all his life,

and where, in 1960, he met Dorothy (our Church Reader). In 1964 he was asked by a former boss to work with him in Kuwait, making water pipes. In 1965 he came home to marry Dorothy. They returned to Kuwait for another year, after which they came to Luton, where Gerry worked for SKEFKO.

They lived in Leagrave, where their two daughters were born. There, he played cricket for Electrolux. His next employment was at A.C. Delco in Dunstable, and the family moved to Kensworth in 1973.

Gerry was always keen on sport. He played football and cricket in London, then badminton, and when the Dunstable Leisure Centre opened, he played squash. He continued to follow Crystal Palace F.C., but cricket was always his passion. His other passion was climbing mountains. He had visited the Lake District when he was at school, so every holiday was taken there, climbing in the hills.

On retirement, Gerry became a Parish Councillor in Kensworth, and kept a close eye on Luton Airport until his health became too bad. A wise person with a great sense of humour, he will be much missed.

In July we also said goodbye to Doris Spriggs of Studham at the grand old age of 101!

Doris was a dedicated member of the congregation at Studham Church; in fact her whole life revolved around the Christian faith, both with her husband, Jack, and in her later years. A VOLUNTEERS DIARY

You may well have noticed that the hay has now all been cut and taken away and September is the month when we start cutting all the other long grass in the Tree Cathedral.

Throughout the summer it is left long, as it is a great habitat for bees, butterflies, insects, and birds. We have seen many species of butterflies this summer



including Brimstone, Peacock, Red Admiral and Speckled Wood. Longer grass also helps retain humidity and soil moisture, making it perfect for insect larvae and other soil invertebrates, particularly moths and craneflies, which in turn provides food for our birds.

We strim all the long grass areas at the end of the summer. This includes areas in The Easter and Christmas chapels, and we are always extremely careful and vigilant, as there are often small mice and shrews scurrying about, and also toads enjoying the moist grass.

A major job we have taken on this summer is clearing the lcknield Way footpath, that runs along the south and west perimeter, of over-hanging branches, brambles, and many holly bushes, which have self-seeded. This has opened the well-used footpath to how it was 20 years ago and made it safer and more dog walker-friendly for all. Whilst doing this, we noticed quite a few trees being taken over and strangled with ivy so we have been clearing each tree as we go and hopefully this will help them survive. The bonfire area is now getting full, so that is a definite job for the next few weeks.

FINES FOR LITTERING AND FLY-TIPPING INCREASE

The maximum fines for fly-tipping have increased to £1,000. In addition, fines for litter and graffiti have increased to £500.

Central Bedfordshire Council recently issued a $\pounds400$ fixed penalty notice relating to a fly-tip in Studham – the $\pounds400$ has now been paid; the culprit got off lightly as the fine would now be $\pounds1000$.

If you see fly-tipping in action, call the police on 999 and report it as a crime in progress. Record as many details as possible: vehicle's registration number and details. To get rubbish removed report to Central Beds Council.

STUDHAM COMMON AND SCHOOL

FRIENDS OF STUDHAM COMMON

Following our 16th successive annual Community award for a Green Flag status, the next work party for the Friends will be on 16th September.

On the East Common we will be cutting and clearing grass, bracken and bramble, as necessary, from the southern boundary. On Middle Common we will clear around the Enright orchard and Platinum Jubilee trees, including mowing around the benches and main trees and clearing along the base of the hedges on both Commons.

The objective is to reduce nutrient levels in order to create a variety of habitats for small mammals and birds. Whilst scalloping areas of grass will enhance the visual appreciation of some individual trees, it will also produce an overall more natural appearance and help to maintain the footpaths.

In addition, on the East Common we will reduce brambles etc. by the planted gorse at the car park and also opposite on Middle Common, in order to prevent the gorse becoming smothered by the vigorous growth of these plants.


PARISH LINK

AUTUMNAL EQUINOX

The Earth, on its tilted journey round the Sun, has two days in the year when every part gets 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness (*equi* (equal) and *nox* (night). The first is the Vernal, or Spring, Equinox, which is in March, as the sun appears to move north and our days get longer.



In September the Autumnal Equinox happens, when our winter approaches. People have marked this in different ways in many cultures:

- in Japan, China, Hong Kong and Taiwan there are Bank Holidays.
- native Americans in Mississippi watch the sunrise through a large circle of timbers, a bit like Stonehenge.
- in the Jewish religion, Rosh Hashana is held at the new moon before the equinox, and Sukkot marks the next full moon.
- here in the UK, and in other European countries, harvest festivals are held, to mark the end of summer reaping. There are church festivals on the nearest Sunday to the Equinox.

If you are interested in astrology, the Autumnal Equinox marks the change from Virgo to Virgo.

The date of the equinox varies slightly from year to year, between the 21st and 23rd September. To be exact, this year, 2023, the moment of equal day and night is on 23rd at 6.50am precisely!
