OPAL - OCTOBER'S BIRTHSTONE

Traditionally, the opal is the birthstone for October. It is believed to bring luck, health and love to its wearer. To astrologists, the stone represents the star sign of Libra, symbolising sincerity and purity.

Opals are unique gemstones that display an array of colours when exposed to light, caused by the way light interacts with tiny silica spheres within the stone. Opals can range in colour from milky white to black, and can contain flashes of other bright colours. They are formed from water that seeps into cracks in rocks and then evaporates over time. This process leaves behind deposits of silica that eventually solidify. The tiny spheres are stacked like marbles in a box, causing a unique sparkling and flashing effect. They diffract light in a fantastic variety of patterns and colours, which shimmer, and the shimmer is considered the opal's most characteristic quality.


The most famous source of opals is Australia's Lightning Ridge region, where *black opals* are found. These have a dark body tone and exhibit the most vibrant play of colour. *White or light-coloured opals* also display this, but with less vibrancy. *Boulder opals* have a layer of ironstone on their side, which makes them more durable, while *crystal opal* is transparent or translucent.

Today, opal is Australia's national gemstone.

LIFESTYLE

ECO-TIPS FOR AUTUMN

- * Try and leave a small section of fallen leaves in your garden for small animals to hide in.
- * Enjoy seasonal food which has fewer air miles and therefore carbon emissions enjoy apples, blackberries, leeks, pumpkins, butternut squash, mushrooms. See if you can try a new vegetarian seasonal recipe this month.
- * Following the Harvest Moon in September is the 'Hunters Moon' or 'Blood Moon' in October; try and find a good spot to do some night sky gazing.
- * Stock up your bird feeders with seeds.
- * If you have children and celebrate Halloween, rather than ordering another costume from Amazon, see if you can swap an old costume with a friend, go to a charity shop or repurpose some clothes. If you're decorating a pumpkin, try and use it afterwards and then put the waste in a compost bin.



12TH CHILTERNS WALKING FESTIVAL

This will take place 14th – 29th October and will feature a programme of over 50 walks and events throughout the Chilterns. Events include:

- Coffee, cake & chat.....many of the walks take in a café, pub or farm shop, some of them in tucked-away scenic locations.
- History & Heritage...Explore the First World War trenches at Marlow Common, Arts & Crafts architecture in Amersham and Chesham, iron age hillforts or the former rural industries around High Wycombe. Discover and walk some of the ancient routes which criss-cross the Chilterns, exploring Drovers routes (and inns!), or take the Chinnor & Princes Risborough railway.
- Wildlife and Nature...see the woodlands at their autumnal best, enjoy the crunch of the beechnuts underfoot, and the trees and hedgerows bursting with colour. There are walks taking in nature reserves and the special landscapes and views of the Chilterns, led by knowledgeable guides. Find out about the management and conservation projects in these special places.

GREAT WORK BY THE WHIPSNADE KNIT AND NATTER GIRLS

Whipsnade Knit and Natter girls have been knitting Trauma Teddies for the L&D hospital and the police service. They are used by the police following road accidents or various other incidents of trauma involving the social services.

WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - VOLUNTEERS DIARY

In early September, we started clearing and strimming the area in and around the car park. High winds had resulted in a lot of branches and other debris falling in this area, making it look extremely untidy.

We now start to think about leaf clearing, although since August, we have noticed quite a few of the trees, particularly the Oaks, have already started to shed a lot of leaves. This is because of dry conditions through the summer. The grass turns to straw and the ground to dusty mud; the trees respond by shedding their leaves. This is an emergency response to protect the plant from dehydration.



Now is also the time we start to think of the annual leaf sweep; we enlist the help of staff from The National Trust and we have had assistance from the scouts and cubs. This job is hard work but good fun; the sweep this year is on 26th November: if you are fit and able, bring a rake and come and join us, we would be more than pleased to see you.

We have still not had time to clear the bonfire area, which has an accumulation of summer cuttings and general debris. A lot of the branches that resulted from clearing the Icknield Way footpath were taken by Craig from Whipsnade Zoo, who collects for the animals and can often be seen in and around the area in his Whipsnade

Zoo truck stacked high with elephant or giraffe fodder.

As always it is great talking to you all as you walk through The Tree Cathedral and hopefully will make a few new acquaintances at the annual leaf sweep.
