November is the month of remembering. Remembering our loved ones who have gone before us and also those who gave their lives for our freedom in the many wars of the last over one hundred years.

I really enjoy watching the BBC programme the Antiques Roadshow and I am always humbled by the stories of the medals of war veterans that are featured. The descendants of these veterans often bring grainy black and white photographs of their family member. The stories and the reasons for the medals shine a spotlight on the bravery of these people. We get to hear how they saved their comrades and battled on in impossibly difficult situations ignoring their own safety.

In September in Glasgow there was a man who had never been told by his father the story behind the Victoria Cross that his Sikh father Naik Gian Singh had been awarded in Burma in the Second World War. It was a story of incredible bravery and courage. As Mark Smith, the BBC expert, said, the medal was made of bronze because Queen Victoria said it should "not to be made of something precious because it is not about the medal but the deed behind the medal." The Victoria Cross has been awarded to fewer than 1,400 people.

As we remember this month all our loved ones, both known and not known to us and the bravery of some, we ask God to comfort us in our loss and remind us of the promise of heaven.

Lord Jesus, when our time on earth is over, gather us with all your saints to be with you for ever. Amen.

#### FRIENDS OF STUDHAM COMMON

The next work party for the Friends will be on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> November. We plan to work on East Common, where we will be undertaking a general cut and clearance as necessary, including scalloping grass edges to enhance the visual appreciation of individual trees and provide a more natural look to the finish.

Cutting back vegetation will also reduce nutrient levels for the more vigorous plants and thereby create a variety of habitats for small mammals and birds.

We will focus along the east side of East Common, cutting back around the hazel plantings and also on the north side of the Common, near the concrete road. Trimming a 1 metre wide strip along each side of the concrete track will stop bushes intruding onto the track and thus forcing vehicles onto the opposite grass verge.

## (New) Telephone Mast Consultation

Following a suggestion we made to ZSL, a proposal has now been worked up for siting of a new **4G/5G telephone mast** on zoo land to provide enhanced mobile signal coverage in our area. The proposal is for a 25m monopole structure, situated on the Eastern Zoo boundary, providing signal coverage across the zoo and across Whipsnade, Oldhill Wood and Studham but, unlike previous unsuccessful proposals, the new mast will not be close to any residential properties.

The proposal will be going out to wider public consultation very shortly and our plan is to work with ZSL, the scheme promoters, and all other stakeholder groups to assist with this process and ensure a smooth passage through planning. #### WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - VOLUNTEERS DIARY

Its leaf collecting time again! We start with the main bridle ways and then turn our attention to the four chapels. The summer chapel is the most challenging with its large oak tree depositing a deep layer of leaves and bucketfuls of acorns this year particularly. When the weather is dry and bright it is a very satisfying job and great exercise.

This year, we are also starting to cut the laurel hedges, and when collecting the laurel cut-offs, we tend to separate them as laurel leaves have a heavy structure and are very slow at composting. Laurel is an evergreen and gives structure and delineation, providing the walls for the outer perimeter and internal chapel areas. It needs very little care and grows very well in challenging environments. We must avoid cutting during the main bird nesting season, which tends to be between March and August.

The new holly hedge on the north of the Christmas Chapel is finally starting to show signs of growth after some nurturing throughout the last year and there are lots of new berries.

One day each year we have a dedicated **leaf sweep day** where everyone is invited to come along and help out in the mammoth task of clearing all the fallen leaves throughout the entire site. This year's operation will be on 26<sup>th</sup> November starting at 11am. It usually goes on till about 3pm and then refreshments are served in the Village Hall where everyone can relax and discuss their aches and pains from all the hard work!

Come and say hello or come along with a rake on Tuesdays between 9am and 12pm.

## STUDHAM VILLAGE CE ACADEMY AND PRESCHOOL

What another busy month! And with the late sunshine bringing some warm weather, we have been able to truly enjoy our outside spaces fully!

Our Preschool, Hedgehog Class, have been learning about our community. We have posted letters and learnt about many different jobs. We had a visit from Ms Jordan who told us all about the Police force. We could try on uniform and then we

became detectives!



Squirrel Class have been busy learning about local farming. We went on a walk over the fields to see a Big 'Yellow' Combine Harvester!

In Owl Class we have embraced our Forest School Lessons and have been learning about seasonal changes. In particular we have been looking at the lifecycle of an apple tree which is just outside our classroom door. In our Harvest church celebrations, we told the story of Johnny Apple Seed. This term we are visiting Wardown Museum, Luton, where we will

be learning about toys as well as helping a Victorian Housemaid with her daily jobs! Woodpecker Class helped pick apples in a local orchard. We are looking forward to our visit to St Albans Museum where we discover everything Roman!

## THE STORY of GUY FAWKES and BONFIRE NIGHT

Here are some interesting facts about **Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot**:

James I was King of England in 1605. Many people did not like the King's Protestant religion. Thirteen young men, including Guy Fawkes, decided that they needed to take action to get rid of the King.

- Guy Fawkes was born in York on April 13, 1570;
- He was born Protestant but converted to Catholicism at the age of 16;
- Guy became a soldier in the Spanish Army and fought in a war called the 'Eighty Years' War,' fighting for the Catholics against Dutch Protestants;
- In Spain, he was given the nickname 'Guido';
- He made friends with Robert Catesby. It was Catesby's idea to blow up the Houses of Parliament to kill the King;
- Guy Fawkes' role in the Gunpowder Plot was to look after the 36 barrels of gunpowder, hidden in a basement underneath the House of Lords;
- This amount of gunpowder was enough to blow up the Houses of Parliament and everything else within a mile;
- One of the plotters was a traitor and informed an MP, who told the King;
- Guy Fawkes was arrested in the basement on 5<sup>th</sup> November 1605 and was taken to the Tower of London:
- King James I decreed that the day of November 5 should be celebrated as the day on which the Gunpowder Plot failed;
- Every year, people set off fireworks and light bonfires on Bonfire Night;
- There is an island called 'Guy Fawkes' in the Pacific Ocean where nobody lives. No one knows why it was named after him!
- Beefeaters still search the Houses of Parliament before the King visits at the State Opening of Parliament (this year 7<sup>th</sup> November).

Top Tips for a safe evening

- Leave plenty of space around the firework area;
  - Check the area for animals;
  - Check the wind direction;
  - Prepare an emergency water supply;
  - Protect your pets;
- If your bonfire is getting out of control, don't hesitate, call the fire service immediately.
