At the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the guns fell silent.

I sit writing this article at the end of Remembrance Sunday during which I have had the privilege of joining with many of you to reflect on the tragedy of human suffering in times of conflict. World War One was meant to be the war which ended all wars and the century which has followed on since then has been a painful reminder that this was not the case.

Conflict between humans is nothing new and has been with us since the beginning of time on many different levels. I was reminded of this recently when I was contacted by a University in Sweden who were undertaking some research and asked me some questions concerning the Rev Ivan Young, who was the Vicar of Kensworth during the mid-twentieth century. Talking about this to some of the parishioners one commented that Ivan would get quite animated when talking about the War, although it is often difficult to ascertain whether he was referring to WW1 or the medieval war between the Shepherds of Whipsnade and Kensworth over grazing rights and boundaries. If anyone reading this has any further knowledge on these disputes, I would be most interested to learn more.

However, whether it is a local dispute or a global concern, it highlights to us the very real need to pursue for all that makes for peace and as we turn from Remembrance and head towards Advent and Christmas, the world now, more than ever, needs the Prince of Peace. As Edmund Sears wrote back in 1849:

Yet with the woes of sin and strife
The world has suffered long;
Beneath the angel strain have rolled
Two thousand years of wrong;
And man, at war with man, hears not
The love-song which they bring;
Oh, hush the noise, ye men of strife
And hear the angels sing.

For lo! the days are hast'ning on, By prophet seen of old, When with the ever-circling years Shall come the time foretold When Christ shall come and all shall own The Prince of Peace, their King, And saints shall meet Him in the air, And with the angels sing.

May it be that this Christmas time will be a peaceful one for you all. For his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace.



WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - VOLUNTEERS' DIARY

December and January are probably the quietest months for the volunteers at the Tree Cathedral. Apart from the mammoth task of cutting the miles of hedges and continuing with leaf collections, the main job is keeping the area tidy.

We started the month clearing the entrance outside of the Tree Cathedral, using brush cutters and strimmers, raking up the debris and then a long wheelbarrow walk to the bonfire area!

In a couple of weeks' time, The National Trust will cut down two Norway Spruce from the Christmas Chapel – one for the church, and the other for the Visitor Centre at Dunstable Downs. This is a tradition that has taken place for many years. We then plant two more Norway Spruce in their place and clear away any remaining branches ready for people to come and enjoy the Christmas Chapel in the centre of the Tree Cathedral.

After the main leaf sweep when we collected most of the fallen leaves, we are planning to use the mower to cut and break up the remaining leaves.

We are also looking at restructuring the leaf collection area to make it more efficient, probably having three bays at all different stages of composting, enabling us to use the leaf mulch in areas around the Tree Cathedral. A job for 2024! We volunteer on Tuesday mornings if you would like to join us.

BIN NEWS

Kerbside collections of garden waste are paused every winter across Central Bedfordshire. The suspension will take place for a 12 week period from Monday 4th December 2023 until Friday 23rd February 2024 inclusive.

Christmas revised refuse and recycling collection days:

Normal collection Monday 25th December will be on Saturday 23rd December; Normal collection Monday 1st January will be on Tuesday 2nd January.

Local Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) will continue to stay open seven days a week, between 9am and 5pm, except on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day when they're closed. On Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, they will be open between 9am and 1pm. Don't forget ID proof that you are a resident of Central Bedfordshire.

MOBILE TELECOMMUNICATIONS MAST, WHIPSNADE ZOOShared Access are working with O2 and Whipsnade Zoo to improve mobile coverage across the area.

At the recent Studham and Whipsnade Parish Council meetings, Shared Access presented their plans to build a new mobile phone mast on the southern boundary of Whipsnade Zoo to facilitate better mobile phone coverage across the area. Over the last year, Shared Access have been working with the Zoo and O2 to develop the scheme, comprising a 25m phone mast and associated equipment. Whilst this will initially be for the O2 network, there will be the opportunity for other mobile operators to join.

The improved coverage will enable local residents to have better access to phone services, and will bring benefit to local businesses who currently struggle with poor reception. The development will not only benefit the local community but also Whipsnade Zoo, who are actively looking for improved coverage across the site to facilitate their plans for a better visitor experience.

The planning application will be submitted to Central Bedfordshire Council. Once registered, the Council will accept letters of support or objection in respect of the application. Anyone who wishes to make a representation on the proposals should write to the planning officer directly, once the application is registered. The Parish Council defibrillator locations are at:

These are all in locked combination code cabinets. The 999 Ambulance Service can give the code to the caller. If far from the cabinet or unable to leave the casualty, the VETS (Volunteer Emergency Telephone System) can be called on 01582 383380 (Option 1 – Holywell, Option 2 – Red Lion, Option 3 – Sports and Social Club) to contact a volunteer who can go to the cabinet and take the device to the casualty. More information is included in the leaflet that has been distributed to every household.

If you would like to become a defibrillator volunteer, e-mail clerk@studhamparish. co.uk with: name, address, home phone and mobile number.

Please note that if your phone has a minder/block on before answering, the VETS system won't work with that, and you may not be able to volunteer if this is set up on your phone.

Hedges: a reminder to residents that they are responsible for ensuring that hedges and vegetation do not block footpaths, pavements and highways. The website 'Street cleansing, litter and road sweeping/Central Bedfordshire Council' has more information on reporting overgrown shrubs or hedges.
