Dear new friends,

Spring is full of new things and fresh shoots. I still feel my newness and this is my first Link letter. I am settling in as minister at Studham Methodist Church, having arrived in September. It was a great privilege to share with St Mary's and Studham CoE School for their harvest service in October during Revd. Nicola's well-deserved sabbatical, and I was able to be with the village for Remembrance Sunday. As is usual with Methodists, I work with several other chapels and their communities. Whilst in the oddities of boundaries a different minister works at Kensworth Methodist, Rev. Nick is already familiar to many.

Spring is also a sense of new life, the dormant trees bring forth new leaves, and the manse garden is unveiling a range of crocuses. It is in this season we mark Easter with the story of Jesus and his rising from the dead. Many years ago I spent time with a church in South Australia and what struck me was the experience of an Autumn Easter. The images of new life that I was familiar with were replaced with shortening days, and falling leaves.

The reality of the Easter story is more than the new life – expressed with spring chickens, lambs, and eggs. It is also the story of pain and grief, and the time of limbo between Good Friday and Easter Day.

Whilst not all come to festival times as moments of faith, but celebrating the joy (and the chocolate) of the occasion – maybe we also need time to recognise and allow time for the lower points in life, since they are as much a part of our journeys. And maybe facing the tough stuff makes the celebrations more significant.

Whatever Easter means to you – school holidays, chocolate eggs, children's events – may you have time to notice both the challenges and the joys of life.

TREE CATHEDRAL & TABLE TENNIS

WHIPSNADE TREE CATHEDRAL - a volunteer's diary

We have finally completed the mammoth task of cutting the laurel hedges and other hedges that form all the delineated areas of the Tree Cathedral. The birds that have all started their spring rituals can now start building their nests.

Unfortunately, through the very stormy weather, several large trees came down, so we have spent a considerable amount of time clearing areas of debris, and our bonfire area needs attention. You will also notice the large pile of leaves, which will start to mulch down in the coming months. We are also spending time tidying the Easter chapel ready for the end of the month, and the beautiful display of daffodils and cherry blossom.

We will be concentrating on pollarding the willow trees in the far west corner of the site. This involves cutting back all the annual growth, which in the case of these trees can be 8 feet. This means we can control the height and spread of the willows and also ensures vigorous and healthy new growth each year.

Another job is the viburnum hedge which borders the Christmas chapel. We will be clearing beneath the hedge to try and prevent viburnum beetles from laying their eggs. This happens in late March and can be catastrophic, as they feed on the leaves quickly destroying the plant. We will also be planting more viburnum, to fill in any gaps along the hedge.

Come and visit the Tree Cathedral this month, and, if you fancy helping us, come and say hello on Tuesdays 9am – 12pm.

We are a welcoming group of mature players with mixed abilities at table tennis. Some players repeat what they are told when making the shots, some pick it up quickly, others take a little longer but the players persevere and want to improve – it is great to see the determination in their faces and the frustration when they can't do what they think they should be doing.

EVERY NEST HAS A PLASTIC LINING!

You may be surprised to learn that birds are increasingly gathering pieces of abandoned plastic waste to build their nests. This is potentially dangerous to



young chicks if they become entangled in the plastic. Plastic is also indigestible if accidentally eaten, and nests made from brightly coloured plastic make them more visible and the chicks more vulnerable to predators. For most species of birds, the nest has to keep the eggs both warm and dry, and plastic may be less effective at keeping its occupants warm and may prevent moisture from draining through, impacting hatching success.

We already know how dangerous plastic waste is to both sea and river creatures, but this new revelation is very disturbing. Although manufacturers and supermarkets are making progress with reducing the amounts of plastic used in packaging, we can all do our bit for nature by recycling, re-using and reducing our use of plastic as much as possible. So please spare a thought for wildlife by disposing of your plastic litter responsibly, to ensure it does not find its way into the natural world. (See also page 21).

EARTH HOUR An initiative led by the World Wildlife Foundation (WWF). It is one of the world's biggest grass-root environmental movements and aims to encourage people to make a small difference in tackling climate change and protecting nature. It began in 2007 in Sydney, when 2.2 million individuals switched off their lights for one hour, marking the beginning of the Earth Hour movement. This has now gone global and more than 190 countries are taking part.

What we are doing in Studham, Kensworth and Whipsnade? This year we are meeting at St Mary's Church, Kensworth, on Saturday 23rd March to mark this hour (8.30 – 9.30pm) by a short night walk from Kensworth Church and back, finishing off with refreshments at the church by candlelight. Led by an experienced and trained supervisor and keen walker, Jane Bedlington, we'll be listening to the sounds of nature at night, and stargazing if it's clear. All ages are welcome, but we ask parents and carers to stay.



What to bring: wear warm waterproof clothes and bring a torch.

If you can't join us, you could have an Earth Hour of your own by turning the lights and devices off at home, going for a walk, having a candlelit dinner or watching a nature documentary such as Planet Earth.
